Dr Hee Sook LEE-NIINIOJA is a scholar/journalist/artist/designer. She is specialised in comparison of Hindu-Buddhist-Christian-Islamic architectural ornamentation, semiotic text-image relationship (particularly Goethe), memories, perceptions, emotions, and cultural heritage. As an Asian pioneer in Scandinavia in the 1970s, she earned her BAs (journalism at Ewha Womans University, South Korea as 'the Best Student'; art and design at the National College of Art and Design, Norway), MAs (visual communication both at the National College of Art and Design, Norway and at Syracuse University, the USA), PhD (architecture at Oxford Brookes, the UK) and further theology/philosophy/literature/language studies in several countries. She has a good command of many languages. Besides international exhibitions about "Goethe in me", academic presentations-papers, journalistic articles, monogram book publishing, and editorial reviews, she volunteered humanitarian work and teachings/lectures abroad, as the wife of the Finnish Ambassador H. E. Markku Niinioja, hoping to enhance communications between different cultures and religions across the globe. Honoured with 'the Civil Merit Medal' by the President of South Korea and appreciations from abroad such as Kuwait and Indonesia, she is currently engaged with cultural heritages at ICOMOS-ICICH, International Press Centre Helsinki, Global Network of Water Museums, international organisations, and academic journals.

Françoise LEMPEREUR, PhD




Holds 4 university degrees obtained at the University of Liège: Romance linguistics (1971), Teaching (1972), Ethnomusicology (1973) and Information and communication, with a doctoral dissertation on the Transmission of intangible cultural heritage (2008). Professional journalist at the Belgian public Radio-Television from January 1974 to March 2005, she wrote or directed numerous radio and TV reports and documentaries devoted to cultural heritage and living culture and received, among others, the 1996 Journalism Prize of the Council of the French Community of Belgium. At the same time, she has developed skills in European ethnology and is recognized as an expert in intangible cultural heritage, in particular by UNESCO and the European Commission. She is a member of numerous scientific councils and, since 2010, the Belgian representative to the International Committee for Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICICH) of ICOMOS. Author of more than a hundred scientific or popular books and papers on intangible heritage, popular arts and traditions, history and tourism, since 1986 she has been a lecturer at the University of Liège (Belgium), where she currently holds courses in Intangible Cultural Heritage

Parallèlement, elle a développé des compétences en matière d'ethnologie européenne et est reconnue experte en patrimoine culturel immatériel, notamment auprès de l'UNESCO et de la Commission européenne. Elle est membre de nombreux conseils scientifiques et, depuis 2010, la représentante belge au Comité international du Patrimoine culturel immatériel (ICICH) de l'ICOMOS. Periodista profesional de la Radio-Televisión pública belga desde enero de 1974 hasta marzo de 2005, escribió o dirigió numerosos reportajes y documentales de radio y televisión dedicados al patrimonio cultural y la cultura viva y recibió, entre otros, el Premio de Periodismo 1996. del Consejo de la Comunidad Francesa de Bélgica. Al mismo tiempo, ha desarrollado habilidades en etnología europea y es reconocida como experta en patrimonio cultural inmaterial, en particular por la UNESCO y la Comisión Europea. Es miembro de numerosos consejos científicos y, desde 2010, representante belga en el Comité Internacional del Patrimonio Cultural Inmaterial (ICICH) de ICOMOS. Chao-Shiang LI, PATRICK, PhD



Chao-Shiang holds the PhD at the Ironbridge International Institute for Cultural Heritage, University of Birmingham (UoB), UK. His doctoral thesis exploring the valorisation of tangible cultural heritage initiates his academic route regarding the transformation of intangible cultural heritage (ICH) in a wider agenda, including the digital documentation of ICH, the rituals of folklore festivals, and the narrative of industrial heritage. Before joining the Cultural Properties Research Centre at China University of Technology (Taiwan) as the associate researcher, he was the co-organiser of UoB Summer School for Cultural Heritage, and the associate curator of the exhibition: The Cultural Heritage of Taiwan, Diversity and Transformation. He was a project researcher in heritage conservation and a lecturer of creative industries in national universities. He is now the teaching fellow of narrative interpretation in the faculty of interior design. His current research interests lie in how people produce, interpret and consume heritage within a changing and cross-cultural world by exploring the relationship between the interpretations and (re)use of heritage by visiting the contextual narrative. He expects to contribute himself and advance the exchanges with international professionals by enrolling ICICH.

Monalisa Maharjan is a researcher at CIDEHUS (Interdisciplinary History Center, Cultures and Societies) and UNESCO Chair in Intangible Cultural Heritage and traditional know-how (Portugal). She has a PhD in Art History and Heritage Studies from University of Évora, Portugal. Her PhD dissertation was on the Linking Tangible and Intangible Heritage with the case study of *Yenya Punhi* festival of Kathmandu and *Guthi's* related to it. Her Master's thesis was on conflicts between house owners and UNESCO world heritage sites in three cities of Kathmandu. Her current research work is focused on authenticity of heritage post 2015 earthquake reconstruction in Kathmandu and changing historic urban landscape in Kathmandu Valley. She is Co-coordinator of ACHS Intangible Heritage (ICH) Researchers Network and Assistant to editor in Journal of Cultural Heritage Management and Sustainable Development. She is also news correspondent for ICHCAP e-newsletter. She is also active in heritage advocacy in Nepal. Her research interests are on Intangible Cultural Heritage, Indigenous Knowledge, Community Participation and UNESCO Conventions.

Dr Hossam Mahdy is an Egyptian and British independent consultant and researcher living and working between Cairo and Oxford. He earned his PhD from Glasgow University. Thesis title: “Attitudes towards Architectural Conservation. The Case of Cairo”. He earned his MSc from University of Louvain on the conservation of historic buildings and sites, and his BSc from Ain Shams University in architectural engineering. Hossam was a fellow at ICCROM, a visiting scholar at GCI, and UCL Qatar. He is a member of ICOMOS-UK and ICOMOS-CIAV. Architect/retired activist. Maire Mattinen, architect (Aalto University Helsinki, 1980) studied Architectural Conservation at ICCROM in Rome. Before retiring (2014), she was a director at the Governing Body of Suomenlinna, the World Heritage site in front of Helsinki. Before that, she was a director of the Department of Monuments and Sites at the Finnish National Heritage Board, where she worked three decades. As a writer and a teacher dealing with the building preservation and restoration she worked inter alia at the Aalto University (Helsinki University of Technology).
Nowadays she works as a senior advisor in various projects concerning cultural heritage protection and in world heritage programs. Currently she is serving as the Chair of the Friends of Finnish Designmuseum and Architecture Museum DAMY, member of ICOMOS Finland since 1985 (as a chairperson 1994-99), DoCoMoMo Finland, Finnish Society on the Heritage Education, Chair person of the Advisory Board for the People's houses etc. Earlier she had several tasks in different state committees and working groups dealing with building preservation, training, restoration, ecological building, risk preparedness (Hague Convention), Finnish Architectural strategy, Finnish UNESCO-Committee, World Heritage strategy of Finland etc.


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Blanca NIÑO NORTON





Munish PANDIT



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
Shelley-Anne PELEG, PhD



Lance has a bachelor's degree with majors in Archaeology and Palaeoanthropology in addition to a Graduate Diploma in Heritage Conversation. Lance's exposure to indigenous knowledge and belief systems during his upbringing when combined with formal training allows Lance to bring a unique perspective when practicing. Lance is a strong advocate for capacity building and empowerment of the communities that he has the privilege of collaborating with. Lance's research interests encompasses Rock Art, Cultural Landscapes and the nexus that exists between these two areas through intangible aspects of cultural heritage. Lance has extensive experience in the collection of oral histories, the documentation of cultural connection with the land and the presentation of this information utilising GIS. Lance is currently a member of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Advisory Committee and is the Indigenous Representative for Australia at the 44th session of the World Heritage Committee.



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
